# Holiday Stress and Depression... What To Do for This Season?

This is the season to celebrate the birth of our Lord and Savior, Jesus the Christ; however society promotes it as a season of gift giving, parties and celebrations, decorations, family gatherings and much more. And when we cannot meet those "expectations" of finding the perfect gift(s), wearing the perfect outfit(s), cooking the best meals, and conflict-free family gatherings, for some it can take its toll and cause undue stress and strain. The literature emphasize that we have to be realistic, plan ahead, and seek support to ward off the negative effects of stress and depression which can affect your overall health beyond the holidays.

The National Institute of Health notes the following as symptoms of depressions, keeping in mind that at some point in time in your busy life that we all may experience sadness or loneliness which is a normal reaction to some type of loss or just "everyday" life struggles. But when these symptoms become extended over a long period of time, it is necessary to seek professional help. Some common symptoms of depression are as follows:

- Difficulty concentrating, remembering details, and /or making decisions.
- Feelings of guilt, worthlessness, and/or helplessness.
- Irritability, restlessness.
- · Overeating or loss of appetite.
- · Persistent sadness, anxious, or feelings of "emptiness".
- Thoughts of suicide, and/or suicide attempts.
- Insomnia, early-morning wakefulness or oversleeping.

With the joyfulness and excitement of this holiday season it is important to stay focus on what is realistic and not the ideas which society through the commercialism of gift giving and gift buying has tried to evoke. As people of faith, the gifts of peace, joy, and love giving to one another are more meaningful. Tie them with a warm smile, a hug, and/or kiss will help to reduce your stress level as you journey through this season of giving.

Measures to take to reduce or eliminate stress and depression are found in the following:

- Remember the Reason for This Season celebrating the birth of Christ. Use an Advent calendar to reflect on this season with your friends and family.
- Manage yours and your family expectations before gifts are even purchased know your budget and plan ahead. As they say, "know before you go."
- Start early with planning and prioritizing the tasks you have to do to prepare for your family and yourself.
- Take time for yourself, make sure you get enough sleep, eat healthy meals (enjoy the sweet treats in moderation), exercise, and drink plenty of water.
- Volunteer, giving to others bring about good feelings for both you and those you extend help to.
- Spend fun, no expectation time with your friends and family. Celebrate your family and set aside differences. Try something new, create new rituals.

# Black History Moment: George Carruthers

Namaste! Here is the last installment of our Black History Moments for this year. Enjoy the story of Mr. George Carruthers who made great contributions in the areas of astronomy and physics.

Often, greatness is determined by the times in which one finds oneself. For George Carruthers, growing up in the earliest stages of

the space race, he like most other boys was fascinated with space travel. Unlike most of those boys, he would ultimately go on to make some of the greatest contribution to ever benefit the space program.

George Carruthers was born on October 1, 1939 in Cincinnati, Ohio. His father was a civil engineer while his mother was a homemaker. The family lived in Milford, Ohio and George was an avid science fiction reader and constructed model rockets

with help and encouragement from his father. He also had an interest in astronomy and at age 10, built his first telescope with a cardboard tube and a lens he purchased through mail-order. When his father passed away suddenly, the family moved to his mother's hometown of Chicago, Illinois. There George spent a lot of time in the Chicago libraries and museums and in the Adler Planetarium. He joined various science clubs and was a member of the Chicago Rocket Society. He read with particular interest about the space exploits of the Naval Research Laboratory in Washington, DC and upon graduating from Englewood High School in 1957, he enrolled in the University of Illinois.

Carruthers stayed at the University of Illinois for seven years, receiving a Bachelor of Science degree in Aeronautical Engineering in 1961, a Master's degree in Nuclear Engineering in 1962 and a Ph.D. in Aeronautical and Astronomical Engineering in 1964 (his thesis focused on atomic nitrogen recombination). In his own words, "[W]hen I was in college, I was undecided whether to pursue



aerospace engineering or astronomy as my major, so I decided to take courses in both of them." While doing his graduate work, he also worked as a research and teaching assistant, working with plasma and gases. Upon finishing his Ph.D., he immediately accepted a position with the Naval Research Laboratory (NRL) as a Research Physicist in 1964, having received a fellowship in Rocket Astronomy from the National Science Foundation.

Upon joining the NRL, Carruthers focused his attention on far ultraviolet astronomy, observing the Earth's upper atmosphere and

other astronomical phenomena. In 1966, he became a research assistant at the NRL's E.O. Hulburt Center for Space Research where he began research on ways to create visual images as a means for understanding the physical elements of deep space. He particularly focused on creating a device to analyze and illuminate ultraviolet radiation. His belief was "[T]he far ultraviolet... is of great importance to the astronomer because it allows the detection and measurements of common elements (hydrogen, oxygen, nitrogen, carbon, and many others) in their cool, unexcited state... This allows more accurate measurements of the compositions of interstellar gas, planetary atmospheres, etc.

The ultraviolet also conveys important information on solid particles in interstellar space... and provides for much more accurate measurements of the energy output of very hot stars...". In 1969, Carruthers received a patent for his invention the "Image Converter for Detecting Electromagnetic Radiation Especially in Short Wave Lengths" which detected electromagnetic radiation in short wave lengths.

Further extending his research, he was the principle inventor of the Far Ultraviolet Camera/Spectrograph which would ultimately be used on the Apollo 16 mission to the moon. Ultraviolet (UV) light is the range of electromagnetic radiation that lies between visible light and X-Rays. UV light, thus allows us to take readings of and understand objects and elements in space that are unrecognizable to the naked eye. The 50 lbs., gold-plated camera system was able to record radiation existing in the upper half of the ultraviolet system of the atmosphere. The camera allowed views of stars and celestial bodies and looks into the solar system thousands of miles away, as well as of the earth. A second version of the camera was sent on the 1974 SkyLab space flight to study comets (it would be used to observe Halley's, West's and Kohoutek's comets). One of the great uses of the camera was to permit a viewer to visually see the effects of pollution on the atmosphere. The camera also was able, for the first time, to detect hydrogen in space, which gave an indication that plants were not the only source of oxygen for the Earth and led to a renewed debate about the origin of stars.

George Carruthers has continued to offer innovation in the areas of astronomy and physics and has been active in outreach programs seeking to bring science to youth around the country. He has been lauded for his efforts and achievements. He was named Black Engineer of the Year in 1987, awarded the Arthur Fleming Award in 1971, the Exceptional



Achievement Scientific Award from NASA in 1972, the Warner Prize in 1973 and was inducted into National Inventors Hall of Fame in 2003. His success is primed to lead to greater achievements by those who follow in his footsteps in the future.

# **MAAFA Commemoration**

The Marks of Empire: Remembering Our Past, Recognizing Our Present, Reshaping Our Future | by Eva J. McLeod

Reverend Dr. Shanell Smith is the epitome of Black Essence and Black Pride. Dr. Smith is the first African American woman who has a Ph.D. in the "New Testament". She is the epitome of the "MAAFA". She just didn't attain her status, she owns it. She didn't close the door of opportunity behind her...She came to Mt. Aery Baptist Church to educate, advocate and disease the stereotypical myths of the "MAAFA" to the people at Mt. Aery, so they can have a clear understanding of its content. She is an assistant professor of New Testament and Christian Origins Coordinator of the International Ph.D. Program at Hartford Seminary. Dr. Smith taught one of our very own, Pastor Dawrell Rich. She matriculated from Drew Theological Seminary. She is married and the mother of three sons.

On 10/31/12, a workshop was conducted at Mt. Aery Baptist Church whereby Dr. Smith spoke about the MAAFA and its relationship during the middle passage and white colonization, how it recalls and captures the horrific and catastrophic history of the Atlantic Slave Trade, how it explores and exposes its continuing effects on African Americans today. She talked about how the white colonizers took our ancestors and dislocated them from their homes in Africa and how the slaves were human but were dehumanized and considered 3/5 humans.

Dr. Smith highlighted on the way slaves read the bible and how it impacted them. They were forced to read scriptures and learn how to communicate amongst themselves by "signifying" which means "a way to say something but means something totally different." The slaves retreated, in a world where they considered was freedom for them, to steal away and read the bible. Vincent Wimbush a noted author stated that for African slaves to read the scripture is to read darkness. The bible was a tool for oppression, exile and pain. The bible was used as a weapon, evoking the pain while choking the future.

Dr. Smith read from the scriptures of Revelation 17:1-6, educating us through a slide show about the "Women of Babylon". She implied that the Women of Babylon was a true identification of a brothel slave, how fornication and impurities took place during slavery. Sexual abuse was forced upon the women of Babylon who were subjected to Imperial pimps and masters. The White slave owners forced the women of Babylon to turn sexual favors and have sex with them. The slave masters' wives condemned the women of Babylon for having sex with their husband, calling them whores and harlots. The women of Babylon were destroyed and broken. We as African American women can't allow ourselves to be broken, used and abused. We have to learn how to stand strong and empower the younger women who are coming behind us.

As we all know, we come in all hues of colors. The slave master raped our women and castrated our men. I know you are familiar with the "Willie Lynch letter". Sad to say, that conditioning still exist today, whereby our people of color still see themselves as the field Negro and the house Negro. This platform called

earth is a also a platform of a plantation, where we as African Americans are still running away from this thing called the "MAAFA"; not wanting to go back in our history, to understand where we came from, so that we can move forward into our future.

The "MAAFA" Commemoration summarizes as the Great Disaster, the Great Catastrophic and the Great Suffering of horrific pain that our Ancestors had to endure. Dr. Smith stressed that the "MAAFA Experience" entails a period of pain where we as African Americans don't want to experience and continue to explore our history. She charged us to look back in our history in order to acknowledge our past to reshape our future. We have to be willing to confess and confront the evil in us to make better communities. We must ask God to begin the healing process where we as African Americans can and will reach out to the masses with open arms to start the journey of wholeness.

Dr. Smith challenged us to look at ourselves, instead of swaying to "FED" "Finding Enjoyment by Default" which means "I have arrived" in this capitalistic structure of society, eating from the table of the American elitist, with which home ownership, membership to the country club or CEO of a fortune 500 company identify who we are.

Michelle Obama said it best at the DNC that "when the doors of opportunity open, don't shut the door behind you, open up the door and grab somebody else and take them along" Dr. Smith stated that author Renita Weems declared that it's not going to be easy, but it's worth the effort.

The "Duality MAAFA" is the capitalistic structure that destroys us as African Americans. It's the paradox between educated and minority, by which academics and economics causes division from the underprivileged society. She informed us that some people think that Slavery doesn't exist today, but it does. It is not the same slavery that our ancestors endured; however, it is more subtle and more dangerous today than it was yesteryear. The effect of slavery still cripples us as African Americans today. It's the emotional, economic and psychological shackles that are still lingering in our communities. The elements are: fatherless homes, domestic violence, substance abuse, black on black crime, incarceration of our young black men, division and poor education.

We as a people have to allow this "MAAFA Commemoration" to disease us and open ourselves up to GOD, and ask for the healing process to begin, to take us through the doors of self-realization, cohesiveness, faith and empowerment. It will benefit our children and our children's children and their children's children if we continue to embrace the past, recognize the present and reshape our future.

# Bringing the Good News by Pastor Dawrell Rich

In Romans 10:15 the Apostle Paul writes, "How beautiful are the feet of those who bring good news!" On Wednesday, November 14, 2012, following our weekly Bible Study, the 'good news' of the gospel was brought forth by Mt. Aery's own Porsha Williams as she preached her initial sermon entitled, 'Bon Appetite, Let's Eat.' Her sermon text, taken from Matthew 4:1-11, explored Jesus' temptation in the wilderness following his baptism - and challenged attendees to eat then exercise the word of God in our lives. As she preached to this mixed crowd which included Mt. Aery disciples, family, friends, and seminary colleagues, Minister Williams took a well-known scripture and shined a greater light on it - stirring the audience to resounding shouts of 'Amen!'

Underscoring how we as Christians often hear the word of God, but either don't allow it to digest or fail to exercise it, she stated, 'We need a healthy balanced spiritual diet by eating the word. Some of us are spiritually anorexic. In other words, we aren't eating the word enough, if at all. Some of us are spiritually bulimic; we eat the word on Sunday, but we don't give it an opportunity to digest and pass through our systems because we throw it up and...some of us who do eat the word can actually become spiritually obese because we eat the word all the time, but we don't exercise what is in the word.' Therefore, it is necessary that we exercise the word of God in our daily lives – including times of trial or temptation - that we might do as Jesus did and refute the devils attacks appropriately. Jesus' resilience in the face of temptation is, in fact, our chief example of the word at work against the enemy. It was evident Minister Williams spent time in prayer, study, and preparation for this moment as she effectively connected Jesus' response - in this New Testament book – with scripture in the first testament, particularly Deuteronomy. But, what intrigued me most was when she pointed out that just as Jesus responded to Satan's attacks by using the word, Satan refuted Jesus with scripture as well. She stated, 'In verse 6, the enemy is indeed quoting Psalm 91:11-12, which is a Psalm of protection against evil. The enemy strategically picks the part that doesn't have anything to do with him, but has everything to do with the angels of God.' For me, this was an excellent point as it emphasized how the word of God may come from the wrong source, and we must be discerning enough to identify it.

To say that Minister Williams was prepared for this inaugural moment is an understatement; for she stood poised, confident, and articulate as an experienced preacher. It is evident God's hand is upon her and we are confident that the work he has begun in her will be completed. Minister Porsha Williams, on behalf of the Mt. Aery Baptist Church family, we congratulate you on a job well done and pray God's choicest blessings upon you as you grow and mature in ministry.

#### What did we learn from Election 2012?

I think if we learned nothing else, it's that our vote as (African) Americans cannot be bought. This election also reminded us, how valuable it is for us to stand and be counted. It was a concern for many that we as a people would sit back and not cast our vote on Tuesday, November 6th because either we didn't believe it would matter because ultimately whoever is in office wouldn't affect our daily lives or we thought "Obama will be ok" and "I voted in 2008". Thankfully, we proved the naysayers and nonbelievers wrong. We came out in the same record numbers as 2008 and increased the Hispanic vote in 2012 for President Obama. We are still making history; this is the second term for the first African American President of the United States of America.

So what did we learn? We learned we owe it to our ancestors, those that fought for our right to vote, that we cannot take it for granted. Our vote cannot be bought and sold the way we once were as a people! We all must do our part.

Since I was a young student I knew I wanted to be involved in politics and the political process. I believed, "if you're not a part of the solution, you're a part of the problem". As I got older, I began to quote Mahatma Gandhi's more eloquent way of expressing the same sentiment - "Be the change you want to see in the world."

I started my political career early. In high school, I thought

I would run for President of the United States someday. I actually said in 2016. It seemed so far away back then. I still haven't ruled this out completely.

While in college, I ran for Alderman for the City of New Haven. The students at Southern Connecticut State University didn't have a voice downtown yet we lived in New Haven, on campus nine months out of the year and took up a large amount of real-estate in the Beaver Hill section of town. I had already been President of the Black Student Union and fought for a Diversity Requirement to be included in the college curriculum, so running against an eight-time incumbent did not intimidate me. Although, I did not win, we lost by less than 200 votes and more importantly, got SCSU a voice. We registered close to 2000 of the 2,500 students who lived on campus and got a seat at the table. So essentially, we won because we accomplished what we set out to do. Prior to that election, only Yale students had a voice and a seat at the table. I share that story because I want the young people to know they can start getting involved now. Whether they realize it or not, they already participate in the political process when they run or vote for class president or head of their student council.

When I was in high school, I was on Student Council, a Class Officer, Afro-American Club and President of the Greater Bridgeport NAACP Youth Chapter. Young people, you are not too young! I hope you learned in school as well as at home, your ancestors fought and died so that you could have the right to vote. The Voting Rights Act was passed only forty-seven years ago. Don't take it for granted and allow your rights to be bought and sold. Don't make this your modern-day MAAFA.

Back to the original question; What did we learn from Election 2012? What I learned was who really has my back. As I stated earlier, I have always thought I would be in the world of politics. When I learned about Black History in school (during the Month of February), I paid close attention. I knew there was more to our story. I decided, I was going to learn more about my Story, by attending a Historically Black College (HBC); Clark-Atlanta University. While at the AUC, I learned so much more about me and my people that I changed my major to History. You see, History at a HBC incorporates us because we were there. We are American History.

When I returned up north, I wanted to take what I learned and teach it to students in Connecticut, particularly in Bridgeport who are not getting the full story. When I learned details of what our ancestors went through in order for us to have the freedoms we have today (that we take for granted) I wanted to incorporate this in our schools' curriculum. I took to heart "Each one, Teach one".

I was taught to give back to your community and go back and give your brother a helping hand up. This goes against the crabs in a barrel mentality we see oh too often today or the pull yourself up by your bootstraps concept. When did we stop looking out for one another? When did we stop being our brothers' keepers? When did this change? This is not a rhetorical question. Let's put a pin here and save that for another time.

Back to what I learned from Election 2012? According to Aristotle "Man is by nature a political animal". I have witnessed the animalistic behavior in politics but am not willing to concede to such dog-eat-dog behavior. I can take it. I have the strength of my ancestors who paved the way before me. Compared to what they endured, the challenges I face are a cakewalk. More importantly, I have the coat of Armor (Ephesians 6:11) and I fear no man (Psalm 23:4).

Moreover, the world of politics teaches you something new about yourself and about people every day. One of the true upsides is you quickly learn who has your back. The "urban dictionary" defines this phrase as

An expression assuring someone that you are watching out for them.

Comes from making sure you are safe by watching what's behind you when you're busy looking ahead.

I can honestly say my family, my Mount Aery Church family & Pastor Bennett has always had my back. I want to thank you for being a people who Get It! We came out once again, as in 2008 and had a Get Out The Vote rally that many thought would not happen and some hoped it would fail. They were forgetting the anointing that has been bestowed on The Mount. Thank you again to everyone who was involved in making the GOTV rally a success. The rally was simply the pre-celebration for the victory that was soon to come on Tuesday, November 6th and you all participated in that win. But our struggle is not over. We still have work to do. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. wrote in his letter from a Birmingham Jail, "...I am cognizant of the interrelatedness of all communities and states. I cannot sit idly by in Atlanta and not be concerned about what happens in Birmingham. *Injustice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere.*"
