



Bringing more humor and laughter into your life

Laughter is your birthright, a natural part of life that is innate and inborn. Infants begin smiling during the first weeks of life and laugh out loud within months of being born. Even if you did not grow up in a household where laughter was a common sound, you can learn to laugh at any stage of life.

Begin by setting aside special times to seek out humor and laughter, as you might with working out, and build from there. Eventually, you'll want to incorporate humor and laughter into the fabric of your life, finding it naturally in everything you do.

Here are some ways to start:

- Smile. Smiling is the beginning of laughter. Like laughter, it's contagious. Pioneers in "laugh therapy," find it's possible to laugh without even experiencing a funny event. The same holds for smiling. When you look at someone or see something even mildly pleasing, practice smiling.
- Count your blessings. Literally make a list. The simple act of considering the good things in your life will distance you from negative thoughts that are a barrier to humor and laughter. When in a state of sadness, we have further to travel to get to humor and laughter.
- When you hear laughter, move toward it. Sometimes humor and laughter are private, a shared joke among a small group, but usually not. More often, people are very happy to share something funny because it gives them an opportunity to laugh again and feed off the humor you find in it. When you hear laughter, seek it out and ask, "What's funny?"
- Spend time with fun, playful people. These are people who laugh easily—both at themselves and at life's absurdities—and who routinely find the humor in everyday events. Their playful point of view and laughter are contagious.
- Bring humor into conversations. Ask people, "What's the funniest thing that happened to you today? This week? or In your life?" You would be surprised at the funny stories you'd hear.

Creating opportunities to laugh

- Watch a funny movie or TV show.
- Go to a comedy club.
- Read the funny pages.
- Seek out funny people.
- Share a good joke or a funny story.
- Check out your bookstore's humor section.
- Host game night with friends.
- Play with a pet.
- Go to a "laughter yoga" class.
- Goof around with children.
- Do something silly.
- Make time for fun activities (e.g. bowling, miniature golfing, karaoke or a Comedy Show (July 9th, at 8:00 PM right here at Mt. Aery Baptist Church, see the flyer on the back cover).



Aronda (Robertson) Thomas and they share four children, David Benjamin, Talmadge J., II, Ausha Jade and Nia Gabrielle. Pastor Thomas currently serves as the Toledo District Overseer for the Full Gospel Fellowship Baptist Church Fellowship International, Incorporated.

Celebrate Dr. Bennett's 17th Pastoral Anniversary continues





Eli Wilson, Jr., the son of a Baptist preacher and pastor, is an ordained Church Musician. Currently, he is the founder and CEO of Eli Wilson Ministries, Inc., a Church Music Educational Resource Ministry.

Eli brings to the ministry 40 years of service in the area of church music ministry. After being lead of God to leave his teaching position of ten years in the Rochester, New York Public School System, he accepted the position of full-time Minister of Music at the St. Paul Community Baptist Church in the East New York section of Brooklyn. There he supplied leadership to a music department of less than 100 people and created a ministry numbering more then 500. He also developed and managed a paid staff of 10 and a volunteer staff of 30.

In November 1993, God lead Eli to accept the position of Associate Pastor of Music at the Emmanuel Baptist Church of Brooklyn, where Rev. Anthony Trufant is pastor. For almost five years Eli assisted Pastor Trufant in the development of his vision to transform a historically traditional church into a worship center whose aim is to present the Gospel in a manner that meets the needs of God's people in the 21st century.

After leaving Emmanuel, Eli entered the arena of Church Music Consulting. He traveled across the country assisting church leaders in the development of their music ministry departments. As an extension of that ministry, Eli Wilson Ministries facilitates the Chenaniah Church Musician's Clinic every two years in Orlando, Florida. The clinic is designed to educate musicians, pastors, seminarians, choir members, College Students, and other aspiring church music leaders in the practical issues of church music development.

In December 1999 Eli accepted the position of Associate Pastor of Music and Performing Arts at the New Covenant Baptist Church of Orlando. He served in that position until December 2002.

As a composer and independent recording artist, Eli released his first solo recording (1988) entitled "Introducing Eli Wilson, Jr.: God's Word Shall Stand Forevermore". From that recording his composition "I Will Give Thanks" was rerecorded by the Zion Baptist Church Choir of Washington, DC. The title song, "God's Word Shall Stand Forevermore" has been recorded by Keith Pringle (Savoy Records) and Babbie Mason along with the Zion Choir of Rhode Island (Word Records). His composition "Acceptable To You" has been published in the United Church of Christ New Century Hymnal and The African American Heritage Hymnal. It has also been recorded by the Ben Hill United Methodist Church and the Trinity United Church of Christ Choirs.

Recently, Eli released his newest solo recording entitled "In My Quiet Time". Currently, he is traveling the country sharing this fresh proclamation of prayer, praise, challenge, and assurance.

Eli worked as vocal coach and children's choir director on the movie "The Apostle" starring academy award nominee Robert Duvall. During the movie the children perform a Bible Rap-Song co-written by Minister Wilson.

Eli has penned more than 200 compositions for SATB choir, children's choir, and male voices. He is the editor and publisher of The Chenaniah Report, a quarterly church music newsletter.

Eli is a native of New Orleans, Louisiana. He did his undergraduate work at Dillard University in the area of Vocal Music Education. His postgraduate work was done at Colgate-Rochester Divinity School and the Eastman School of Music in the areas of Christian Education and Sacred Music. In 1990 he received the Honorary Doctorate of Humane Letters Degree from Virginia Seminary and College.

Eli is married to the former Brenda Marie Simmons. Together they have two sons Eli III (Tre') and LeVar Antoine (Tony).

Eli is God ordained, God inspired, and Holy Spirit lead. His mission is to do the work of Jesus Christ as he assist the church, and its musicians to strive toward its fullest potential.

Sunday School - Old Testament Class

The theme this quarter for the Old Testament is "Be Responsible" with the use of Warren W. Wiersbe commentary, out of 1 Kings.

Solomon was to be a man of peace and yet he began his reign by ordering three executions. "But true peace must be based on righteousness, not on sentiment. But the wisdom that is from above is first pure, then peaceable" (James 3:17). The land was polluted by the innocent blood that Joab had shed, and the land could be cleansed only by the execution of the murderer. David didn't execute Joab, even after Joab killed Absalom, because David knew that he himself had blood on his hands. David was guilty of asking Joab to shed Uriah's innocent blood, but Solomon's hands were clean. Solomon was indeed a man of peace and he achieved that peace by bringing about righteousness in the land.

David did more than just provide materials for Solomon to use in building the temple. Solomon's father had also forged political alliances that would make for a peaceful environment in which to construct God's house. One of these political alliances was with the influential king of Tyre in Phoenica.

King Hiram of Tyre continued the friendly alliance with Israel that had started under David's reign. In a message to Hiriam, Solomon cited the divinely aided peace of his reign and insisted that it was time to launch construction of the temple. He asked Hiram to mobilize workers and cut cedars in Lebanon needed for the temple.

Hiram heartily agreed to Solomon's request for wood and workers. He extolled Solomon's God-given wisdom and offered to transport the wood to a designated place in exchange for food. Their peaceful transactions led to a treaty between Hiram and Solomon.

Hiram praised God and credited Him with putting Solomon on the throne.

Many scholars believe Hiram's religious vocabulary was an act of political and economic expediency, not an expression of faith. Yet, even if this were so, the Lord still used Hiram to supply materials for the temple.

Is it ever appropriate to ask for a non-Christian's help in a ministry project?

To supplement the work of Hiram's crew, Solomon conscripted thirty thousand laborers from Israel to work one month out of three in Lebanon. Tens of thousands cut and carried stones from quarries in the hills. Craftsmen belonging to Solomon and Hiram worked to prepare the wood and stone for placement in the temple.

Solomon and Hiram traded for several years under this agreement. Out of this exchange came a treaty of peace between them. During this time the Lord made good on His promise to give Solomon wisdom.


Hiram and Solomon were at peace with each other for many years because they both decided to maintain the good will that had begun with David.

St. Paul was in the House. The Renewal Services leading up to the 88th Church Anniversary of Mount Aery Baptist Church was nothing less than spectacular. Each vessel that delivered the Word of God either formerly or currently pastored a St. Paul church, affirming that there are no coincidences, but only God's incidences.

It should be noted that as our cups runneth over, the praise that took place between the last two renewal services were excellent, bar none.


On May 22, 2011, we received Pastor Richard Williams of the Victory Institutional Baptist Church, Hawthorne, California. We were challenged to go higher in the Lord, "lest we forget the wander of our daily walk of Faith". In his message penned, "Such as I have", Act 3:1-11, Pastor Williams reminded us how Peter healed the Lame Man. We truly worshipped God in Spirit and in Word, which was the Truth. The Church Renewal Service leading up to this event was clearly keeping us in step with the Word.

Wrapping up the Renewal Service, on May 25, 2011, the anointed Dr. Lance Watson of St. Paul's Baptist Church of Richmond, Virginia blessed us by re-telling the story of Noah, who was over 600 years old when he received the word that he must build the ark. Brother Kenneth Knight – The Journey Back

For some time now, Brother Ken Knight's presence has been very evident in this place we affectionately call the Mount. As a Sunday worshipper, he has stood time and time again in support of our Pastor as he delivers the anointed word of God. As a participant in our Men's Ministry he has been a voice of reason in fellowship, always willing to share his salty and genuine advice. As a student he has been diligent with our MAIL curriculum, present every time Pastor Williams and our teaching staff have offered lessons. As a member of our Trustee Ministry he's made himself available for any and all things, including getting down and dirty when needed to do the most menial jobs. And perhaps his greatest contribution to this place has been manifested through his willingness to faithfully serve as the first and at times, the only male member of our Prayer Ministry, standing in the gap for those who are unwilling, unable, or simply just need an intercessor. So what happens when the intercessor, suddenly becomes the one who is in need?

One of my favorite songs is a classic by John P. Kee entitled. 'Standing in the Need of Prayer', in this song John's spirit is literally felt through the audio as he sincerely cries out, "It is Me, It's Me Oh Lord, I'm standing in the need of Prayer". This is a song that came to mind during my reflection and prayer time with the Lord after being notified my friend and brother in Christ, Ken had suffered an injury that would eventually cause him to loose a limb. My initial reaction was to pray as intensely as I could for Ken, just as he had done for so many. However, in doing so, and after visiting him after his surgery, it was revealed to me that Ken was receiving exactly what he needed from the Lord already. My thoughts were confirmed months later, as I had the pleasure of sitting with Ken for a very candid conversation about his road to discipleship at Mount Aery, his injury and recovery, as well as his prayer life.

Shay: Good afternoon my Brother. It's been a while, and it feels good to have you back in the house. Can you share briefly about how you became a disciple of Mount Aery?

Ken: Thanks Bro, good to be back. God led me here, although there were other churches in Bridgeport, I came straight to Mount Aery because I was looking for something and I was not being filled at the church where I was at. My father was dying and I needed to be close to Bridgeport. My wife wanted to be at the church in West Haven, but after visiting Mount Aery my mind was made up...I did not tell her yet (laughing). Every church I went to I followed her, but my spirit told me that I needed to be at Mount Aery. I was a member of the church for three months and involved in classes and everything. Then one day I asked Reverend Sherwood if she thought that it was time for me to join the church. She was surprised the same way I was (laughing). I started to listen to God and read the bible more which started to enhance my interpretation. Although not great in the beginning but after messing with Pastor Williams you can't help but to

the insight that I did not have but the greatest part is the wisdom and insight that I was able to attain.

Shay: I am grateful that you are here as well...not only are you a Mount Aery brother but a Trustee along with me. Most are aware of the challenges you have faced, and we are happy that you are on the road to recovery. Would you like to share the particulars of your journey?

Ken: Well...I am supposed to be in rehab but I do not refer to my condition as being in "rehab" instead I call it a "sabbatical". During the time I was injured I did not have time to think about my injury. All I did was read the Word...I had a little bible study going...I've seen a miracle happen before my eyes. I had a roommate from hell because all he wanted to do was argue...I would be reading the Bible and he wanted to argue. I told myself that it was time for me to get up out of the room but God told me to "stand still". To this day I still talk to this person...I call to check up on him...I prayed with him. Before he left Montowese (rehabilitation center) he was not sure where he was going to stay because he did not have any money. He finally agreed to pray with me, although I twisted his arm. He told me that he will pray with me although he insisted that it will not be a long prayer. We prayed and he ended up getting his room, social security, and he is doing well. I call him once every two weeks to check on him...I don't know what church he is going to but he is attending a church now. I just thank God for showing me the miracles that He can make

Shay: What an awesome experience: to have a stint in rehab, transform into a holy sabbatical, filled with the studying of the Word. God has allowed you to minister to other people while you were there.... look what God has done. Father's Day is around the corner and I know that you, like most men, have struggled with having a praying father figure in your life. It is commonly known that in our church as well as others the perception of men being prayer warriors is not strong at all. Can you tell us your thoughts and how you became apart of the Prayer Ministry?

Ken: My prayer life starts with our Prayer Ministry at Mount Aery. Reverend Alicia Sherwood as well as Pastor Williams has been an inspiration to me. The Prayer Ministry has taught me to be faithful in prayer. Sometimes when we hold prayer, I will go somewhere else in the sanctuary and pray by myself. That prayer time has helped me to learn obedience. That is what I want to be...a disciple for the Lord. Currently I am struggling with a few things as to whether I should stay with the Ministry giving that I haven't been involved in the past 7 to 8 months. I owe it to the Lord and myself to give Him credit for where He has brought me from. I am looking for that "shine" and I keep telling myself that I will have the "shine" as long as I keep praying and reading.

Shay: "Shine on Ken"...I am looking at you at this present moment and I am touched, as I see the spirit and passion that God has bestowed on you. You and I

The Return of Ken Knight...Our Beloved "Wounded" understand what you are reading. Pastor Williams had have conversed in the past about this notion of having "child-like faith" which begins with prayer and understanding? How significant is having a child-like faith

> Ken: Well, a child-like faith came to me as I think it was God's way of getting me ready for this sabbatical that I was going to go on. I sat up in the sanctuary one afternoon before prayer and nobody was there as it was 5:00PM and I started reading our Daily Bread which was about childlike faith and as I was reading I sat down and started praying. I asked the Lord to treat me like a little child because a little child believes everything...and that is how I am towards the Bible. I don't question my Pastor on what he does or what he says and I don't question God on what he does and what he says. Whatever my Pastor says to do I will do because I know that God is speaking through him. That day I asked God to take me by my hand and lead me like a child not knowing that I was going to experience the things that I am going through. When I asked Him I felt him grabbing my hand and that is how I knew that He was around me and to this day He still has my hand because He has to treat me like a child. He taught me how to walk and I thank Him for that...I thank Him for grabbing my outstretched hand and leading me.

> Shay: Wow Ken (sigh). I thank you for openness and honesty and I know that people at Mount Aery can learn a lot from a man like you. I thank God for allowing you to continue to stand for yourself and others.

> Ken: I have something else that I want to stay. I haven't had a chance to tell my testimony as I am not able to stand for longer than five minutes thus far. I want to thank my Mount Aery family for their prayers, for their thoughts, and for being there for me. I can name a lot of names in this church of people who have sat down and talked to me...at one point I had a lot of people visiting me and the nurses did not give me any problems. After awhile they knew that it was family. I thank my Mount Aery family as it was due to their prayers that I am still here.

> During our conversation, Ken and I had some surreal moments, as he inspired me to continue to seek a deeper level with the Lord. The raspiness in his voice and sincerity of his speech told a story by itself which eluded to the difficulties and triumphs of his journey back to the sanctified grounds of the Mount. Now, because of my association with Ken, I am aware that he still faces many limitations and still stands in the need. His daily travel back and forth to the doctor and rehabilitation sessions takes a toll and consumes the majority of his energy. And yet as he seeks to regain his strength, his focus is not on those matters. He carries a resolve and joyfulness that leads us to believe he himself is even more spiritual because of his journey. On the eve of Father's Day, it is my prayer that Men of God will come together in prayer more often and intently. As we stand in need, we also can stand in the Gap for another brother on his way up and out of brokenness. Therefore, rendering ourselves to become as Pastor Bennett often says, "Wounded Healers."


I received it very well. Sometimes the truth hurts. I take it as constructive criticism and receive it with love.

Afro-American Flag by: Doreen Cotter



The Afro-American flag, also referred to as the UNIA flag, Pan-American flag or Black Liberation Flag is a tri-color flag consisting of three equal horizontal bands colored red, black and green. It was originally created as the official banner of the African Race by the Honorable Marcus Mosiah Garvey and the members of the Universal Negro Improvement Association and African Communities League (UNIA-ACL). The organization formally adopted the flag in article 39 of the Declaration of Rights of the Negro Peoples of the World on August 13, 1920, during its monthlong convention held at the Madison Square Garden in New York City.

The colors were hoisted first in the **United States**, it represents all people of the **African Diaspora** regardless of land of birth. The flag became an African nationalist symbol for the worldwide liberation of people of African origin. As an emblem of Black pride, the flag became popular during the **Black Liberation movement** of the 1960s.

African Americans have proudly held on to their banner for the past 91 years, hoisting it to represent African or African American unity and pride.

The three colors represent the following:

- Red: the blood that unites all people of African ancestry, and shed for liberation;
- **Black:** black people whose existence as a nation, though not a nation-state, is affirmed by the existence of the flag; and
- Green: the abundant natural wealth of Africa;

According to UNIA-ACL (Universal Negro Improvement Association and African Communities League)

- **Red:** "color of the blood which men must shed for their redemption and liberty"
- Black: "the color of the noble and distinguished race to which we belong," and
- **Green:** "the luxuriant vegetation of our Motherland."

In the United States, the flag is presently widely available through flag shops or ethnic specialty stores. It is commonly seen at parades commemorating **Martin Luther King, Jr. Day**, civil rights rallies, and other special events.

*Honorable Marcus Mosiah Garvey, Jr. – a National Hero of Jamaica (17 August 1887-10 June 1940) was a Jamaican publisher, journalist, entrepreneur, and orator who was a loyal proponent of the Black Nationalism and Pan-Africanism movements, to which end he founded the Universal Negro Improvement Association and African Communities League (UNIA-ACL). He also founded the Black Star Line, part of the Back-to-Africa movement, which promoted the return of the African Diaspora to their ancestral lands.


