

Celebrating 88 Years of Ministry

The First Night of Renewal Service Guest Speaker - Rev. Dr. Leslie D. Callahan

On May 11, 2011, Mount Aery had a guest speaker celebrating the church's 88th anniversary. The Reverend Dr. Leslie D. Callahan from Philadelphia, Pennsylvania; the first African American Woman and fifth pastor who was selected and installed to St. Paul's Baptist Church in the history of 119 years.

For further Biographical information on Dr. Callahan she can be found in the May issue of the Message from the Mount, in the front of the magazine.

As I sat and waited for the speaker to come out on May 11, 2011, I got a surprised of my life. I thought she was going to be an average size woman with a message from the lord. Well, she was more than an average woman in mind, spirit, and

The praise team sang, the congregation was in good spirits as they joined in with the praise team prior to the dynamic speaker coming out to belt out a powerful word from almighty God. What a sermon!!! Dr. Callahan's theme was "Walking Call". She read from the book of Ephesians the 4th chapter the 1st through the 16th verse, King James Version.

Reverend Callahan started her sermon using the analogy of 'Santa Claus is coming to Town". She went on to talk about Kris Kringle and Winter Warlock Kris Kringle was the good guy and winter warlock was the evil one. She stated Kris tries to get out of trouble by offering the Warlock one of his train toys and melts his evil heart. Winter Warlock transforms from villain to victory. Kris Kringle stated your life can change if you start walking putting one foot in front of the other. And soon you you'll be walkin' cross the floor, put one foot in and soon you'll be walkin' out the door. She went on to say that Noah walked with God, Enid walked with God we walk by faith and not by sight hear the calling and answer it with our feet. Walking faith is not so easy, the walk is sometimes full of trials and tribulations but be of good cheer, walk worthily, as it means something to you, be characterize by patience, unity of spirit, humble, peace, gentleness, and fighting to maintain unity.

She also talked about how a baby is born and how the baby starts crawling, pulling up on furniture, struggling to stand up and then falling back down, but gets up again to put one foot in front of the other so that he or she can start walking. Dr. Callahan stated that we are just like babies in Christ. We have to grow, learn, challenge ourselves, be Christ like in order to soul. She clearly stood taller than her maybe five foot stature. grow and move forward. Love your brother, lover your sister, love you neighbor and help somebody along the way. Change is important.

> Being unified is not always easy we must become unified within Christ Jesus; we have to push ourselves past it and get over it. In other words, whatever you are going through you can get past that if you put one foot in front of the other. Grace is the foundation of our sins, continue to look beyond our destiny, we have to walk out the call in order for us grow. It is a long process with no speedy process. God and only God should be our destination. The one who numbered the hairs on our heads, the one whose voice we rejoice to. God never stops calling us.

> Move forward and not with hardened hearts, unify ourselves in God, our calling destination is in God, we are instructed by God. One God, One Church, One Faith, One love we can't get anywhere unless we go together. We have to be unified in order to get there together. Jesus is the light of the world......Shine!!!!! Put one foot before the other, and soon you'll be walking 'cross the floor, if you want to change your direction, if your time of life is at hand, don't be the rule, be the exception, a good way to start is to stand. Put one foot in front of the other.

> What a powerful message, Dr. Callahan charged us to stop being evil hearted, evil minded, help someone else, however, it starts with ourselves, if we want to change. Change starts from within. Mount Aery it's time to put one foot in front of the other.

The History of Juneteenth

Juneteenth is the oldest known celebration commemorating the ending of slavery in the United States. Dating back to 1865, it was on June 19th that the Union soldiers, led by Major General Gordon Granger, landed at Galveston, Texas with news that the war had ended and that the enslaved were now free. Note that this was two and a half years after President Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation - which had become official January 1, 1863. The Emancipation Proclamation had little impact on the Texans due to the minimal number of Union troops to enforce the new Executive Order. However, with the surrender of General Lee in April of 1865, and the arrival of General Granger's regiment, the forces were finally strong enough to influence and overcome the resistance.

General Order Number 3

One of General Granger's first orders of business was to read to the people of Texas, General Order Number 3 which began most significantly with:

"The people of Texas are informed that in accordance with a Proclamation from the Executive of the United States, all slaves are free. This involves an absolute equality of rights and rights of property between former masters and slaves, and the connection heretofore existing between them becomes that between employer and free laborer."

The reactions to this profound news ranged from pure shock to immediate jubilation. While many lingered to learn of this new employer to employee relationship, many left before these offers were completely off the lips of their former 'masters' - attesting to the varying conditions on the plantations and the realization of freedom. Even with nowhere to go, many felt that leaving the plantation would be their first grasp of freedom. North was a logical destination and for many it represented true freedom, while the desire to reach family members in neighboring states drove some into Louisiana, Arkansas and Oklahoma. Settling into these new areas as free men and women brought on new realities and the challenges of establishing a heretofore non-existent status for black people in America. Recounting the memories of that great day in June of 1865 and its festivities would serve as motivation as well as a release from the growing pressures encountered in their new territory. The celebration of June 19th was coined "Juneteenth" and grew with more participation from descendants. The Juneteenth celebration was a time for reassuring each other, for praying and for gathering remaining family members. Juneteenth continued to be highly revered in Texas decades later, with many former slaves and descendants making an annual pilgrimage back to Galveston on this date.

Today Juneteenth commemorates African American freedom and emphasizes education and achievement. It is a day, a week, and in some areas a month marked with celebrations, guest speakers, picnics and family gatherings. It is a time for reflection and rejoicing. It is a time for assessment, self-improvement and for planning the future. Its growing popularity signifies a level of maturity and dignity in America long overdue. In cities across the country, people of all races, nationalities and religions are joining hands to truthfully acknowledge a period in our history that shaped and continues to influence our society today. Sensitized to the conditions and experiences of others, only then can we make significant and lasting improvements in our society.

Juneteenth In Modern Times

Today, Juneteenth is enjoying a phenomenal growth rate within communities and organizations throughout the country. Institutions such as the Smithsonian, the Henry Ford Museum and others have begun sponsoring Juneteenth-centered activities.

Juneteenth today, celebrates African American freedom and achievement, while encouraging continuous self-development and respect for all cultures. As it takes on a more national, symbolic and even global perspective, the events of 1865 in Texas are not forgotten, for all of the roots tie back to this fertile soil from which a national day of pride is growing.

The History of Juneteenth continues

Juneteenth Festivities and Food

Certain foods became popular and subsequently synonymous with Juneteenth celebrations such as strawberry soda-pop. More traditional and just as popular was the barbecuing, through which Juneteenth participants could share in the spirit and aromas that their ancestors, the newly emancipated African Americans, would have experienced during their ceremonies. Hence, the barbecue pit is often established as the center of attention at Juneteenth celebrations.

Food was abundant because everyone prepared a special dish. Meats such as lamb, pork and beef, which were not available every day, were brought on this special occasion. A true Juneteenth celebration leaves visitors well satisfied and with enough conversation to last until the next.

Dress was also an important element in early Juneteenth customs and is often still taken seriously, particularly by the direct descendants who can make the connection to this tradition's roots. During slavery there were laws on the books in many areas that prohibited or limited the dressing of the enslaved. During the initial days of the emancipation celebrations, there were accounts of former slaves tossing their ragged garments into the creeks and rivers to adorn clothing taken from the plantations belonging to their former 'masters'.

Traditions

Traditions include an enunciated public reading of the Emancipation Proclamation as a reminder that the slaves have been proclaimed free. The events are celebratory and festive. Many African American families use this opportunity to retrace their ancestry to the ancestors who were held in bondage for centuries, exchange artifacts, debunk family myths, and stress responsibility and striving to be the best you can be. Celebrants often sing traditional songs as well such as Swing Low, Sweet Chariot; Lift Every Voice and Sing; and poetry from Black authors like Maya Angelou. Juneteenth celebrations also include a wide range of festivities to celebrate American heritage, such as parades, rodeos, street fairs, cookouts, family reunions, or park parties that include such things as African American music and dancing or contests of physical strength and intellect. Some of the events may include black cowboys, historical reenactments, or Miss Juneteenth contests. Traditional American sports may also be played such as baseball, football, or basketball tournaments.

Modern Juneteenth Movement

In 2000, the annual Washington Juneteenth National Holiday Observance and the campaign to establish Juneteenth Independence Day as a National Day of Observance was established. As of 2011, 39 states and the District of Columbia have passed legislation to officially recognize Juneteenth.

The annual National Day of Reconciliation and Healing from the Legacy of Enslavement and the National Juneteenth Black Holocaust "Maafa" Memorial Service were included in the Washington Juneteenth National Holiday Observance. On the "19th of June", 2000, Juneteenth leaders stood with Congressman Tony Hall (D-OH) as historic Apology for Slavery legislation was announced at the U.S. Capitol during the 1st National Day of Reconciliation & Healing From the Legacy of Enslavement. This was followed by the 1st World Day of Reconciliation and Healing From the Legacy of Enslavement, on the "20th of August", in Richmond, VA, in 2010.

We decided to interview a couple of mothers and daughters to get a little insight into their relationship with each other and the church and to see how they celebrated Mother's Day.

Candida Paul

Tonya: Thank you again for doing this interview. I admire how close you and your daughter are so that is why I immediately thought of you guys when we came up with the idea.

Candida: Aww thank you. It's not a problem

Tonya: How long have you been a disciple at Mount Aery?

Candida: I grew up in Mount Aery under Pastor Streets who gave me my first bible. I left for a while then came back after I had my daughter dedicated.

Tonya: So I guess you have seen a lot of changes over the years?

Jenita Hayes

Malék: Happy Mother's Day Jenita and thank you for taking time out to share your experience as we celebrate Mothers.

I would like to begin by letting our readers know a little bit about you. Can you share with us your name, age, your Husband's name, and the city/town you reside?

Jenita: Sure, my name is Jenita Marie Hayes and I'm married to Victor Lee Hayes. I'm 32 years old and reside on the North end of Bridgeport, CT.

Malék: Great, thank you! It's an honor being able to interview my own sister for Mother's Day. This moment is special because you have a miracle of a story to share with the rest of the world let alone the family of Mount Aery Baptist Church. Please tell us your beautiful Daughter's name and age.

Jenita: Let me say it's an honor to be interviewed by my brother. My daughter's name is Attalia Keren Hayes and she is one (1) years old.

Malék: That is a beautiful name, what does complications since my platelets were her name mean?

Jenita: Thank you very much. Her first name means "God's due season" and her middle name means "child of beauty".

Malék: I must say her name definitely sums up her story. I mentioned you have a miracle of a story to share, can you please tell us your testimony in regards to the time leading up to the birth of Attalia?

Jenita: Well, all was going along as usual, my 6 month checkup went well, Attalia was growing and doing just fine. Then the week after my checkup I started getting major headaches like never before. They would keep me up at night without much sleep. If I did fall asleep an hour later I would wake up in such pain. It felt as if my brain was literally trying to escape my head, nothing seemed to help the headaches go away at all. One day I finally called the doctor's office and left a message for the on call doctor to call back regarding the pain I was having. The doctor really couldn't say much since they weren't sure what the headaches stemmed from so I was told if Tylenol didn't work to go to the ER. Then 4:30 am, Thursday, March 25th Victor and I headed to the ER at St. Vincent's Hospital. There we found out that my blood pressure, which was normal throughout both trimesters, was through the roof (220/130). It was ONLY God because under any other circumstance someone would of been passed out and definitely not able to walk themselves into the ER. Test after test we were told I had Preeclampsia Syndrome and was given medicines to bring my pressure down and prepare Attalia in case they needed to deliver. While time was passing a test came back showing that my platelets were dropping. I was then transferred to Bridgeport Hospital, which has the New Born Intensive Care Unit (NBICU) to care for premature births. My blood pressure did respond to the medicine I was given, but my platelets were still getting lower. We were told that the "cure" for Preeclampsia was "Delivery" to ensure that the baby is safe and so I wouldn't suffer any

dropping as time went by. There I was three months from my due date and off I went into surgery at 10:23am then 10:48am Attalia was born. To God Be ALL the Glory!!

Malék: Amen to that! God is more than good! It's such a miracle and a blessing by God to have placed you and Attalia in his arms of protection. For those who have never experienced or could possibly experience your situation, can you tell us how it was for you to go through such a situation? Jenita: Throughout the whole situation I had a sense of peace. You never really know where you are in your faith till you are tested and tried. This situation showed how much we, as a family, believed in Him, yet also showed us how we need to get to a place where we truly are solely relying on Him. Needles, nurses, doctors, machines, tubes, confined to a bed, terminology after terminology, forms after forms, and the list goes on. You just never truly know what you have till you almost/have lost it. This experience was an eye opener for me and my walk with Christ.

Malék: Amazing, absolutely amazing. I thank God for taking care of you and Attalia. We prayed non-stop for God to bring you both through. You displayed a great level of strength and you are a prime example of what it means to be a Mother. How were you able to persevere through such a situation?

Jenita: God was in control! Despite the fact that Victor and I really didn't like the idea of having to give birth three months early, we knew that the doctors had our best interest in mind. We placed it all in God's hands and just prayed and praise God through it all.

Malék: Amen to that! What type of support did you have during the time of Attalia's birth?

Jenita: My family was a great support! When I say family I mean by blood, marriage, and by Spirit. Victor was a great tower of strength was able to come home with us it was so

through it all. He had to bear with hearing the good, bad, and ugly of the situation. I'm truly blessed God brought us together. My mother and my brother (you) were also right there with us as well, every day in my room. It was great to have you all there not just for me, but for Victor as well. I could mention a list of people, but I'll stick with my core support: my hubby, mom, and brother (you).

Malék: That's absolutely wonderful! I'm happy you had such support when in need. That's definitely one example of how family sticks together through thick and thin. When you were able to see your Daughter for the first time, what went through your mind?

Jenita: I didn't know what to really expect. I've seen a few pictures Victor took so I can see how things were going, but once I was standing in front of her...I wanted to touch her and hold her, but it wasn't quite like that. She was connected to machines and I just didn't want to cause anything to beep or get in the way of her continued growth outside of the womb. I was grateful just to be able to look at her face to face that day.

Malék: What were your first words to your Daughter when you saw her for the first time after birth?

Jenita: "Hi babygirl. Mommy loves you, but God loves you best." That was something I tried to whisper to her every time I saw her.

Malék: Wow! I'm sure such words lifted Attalia's spirit and comforted her. Attalia was a premature baby and had to endure receiving medical support just to breath. As with infants in Attalia's situation, it is said premature babies can face some struggles along the way. Can you tell us what it was like being a Mother for you within the first year of Attalia's life?

Jenita: It wasn't easy not being able to take her home when I was discharged, but we were there every day so we can spend quality family time together nevertheless. Once she

As I shared with my sister-in-love (Shakira) "take care of that precious jewel within you", it is an appointed task God has given to all women. Look to Him and He will give you what you need to be that mother He created you to be.

Malék: Thank you and to this day I still say to myself wow my Sister is a mother! The same person I'd always look up to and protect growing up. I would say Attalia is blessed to have you as a Mother. Our Mother did a great job with the both of us and I love seeing you being a Mother to my Niece. May God continue to bless you as you grow and learn new things as a beautiful Mother. Sandra: Hello my sister!

Tonya: Thank you again for taking the time to do this interview.

A Tribute to Anne Frank

This extraordinary sculpture was created by nineteen students from the Neighborhood Studios sculpture class to be displayed in the lobby during Westport Country Playhouse's production of *The Diary of Anne Frank*. Under the supervision of prominent Westport sculptor Steffi Friedman, the students read the book, discussed their reactions, and decided they would like to create a replica of the famous hiding place

From the beautiful scene on the upper right of the family lighting Chanukah candles to the powerful scene at the lower left of the Nazi storm trooper leading the family out of the house, the individual sculptures within the larger work were each fashioned by individual students to illustrate moments in the story.

After the final performance of *The Diary of Anne Frank*, this sculpture will be moved to the Temple Israel in Westport where it will be on the display for approximately one month. It will then be displayed at other houses of worship in Westport and Bridgeport.

Neighborhood Studios of Fairfield County (formerly the Music and Arts Center for Humanity) provides classes in art, music and dance and is a member of the National Guild for Community Arts Education. Classes are offered in a variety of settings: in-school, after-school, Saturday mornings and four summer camp programs, including the NS/AileyCamp® run in cooperation with the Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater. Black History Moment

Father of Gospel Music: Dr. Thomas Andrew Dorsey

Dr. Thomas Andrew Dorsey was born in Villa Rica, Georgia on July 1, 1899 - the oldest of five children born to Rev. and Mrs. Thomas Dorsey. Dorsey began his musical career playing behind noted Blues artists such as Ma Rainey. His association in this circle earned him the nickname, "Georgia Tom". In 1931, he had an epiphany which Dr. Dorsey later described as 'The Finger of God" pointing him toward what we know now as Gospel Music. His first Gospel composition was "Someday, Somewhere".

Following the death of his first wife and son, Professor Dorsey wrote the immortal "Precious Lord, Take My Hand", which he himself described as "the greatest song he'd ever written" amongst the nearly 400 Gospel songs he had also composed. "Precious Lord" has been translated in more than 32 different languages and has been republished in many foreign lands.

In 1932, Dorsey joined Chicago's Pilgrim Baptist Church, where he served as musical director for nearly 50 years. It was also in 1932 that Dorsey established a music studio, publishing company and Convention of Gospel Choirs and Choruses, Inc. Professor Dorsey studied Music at the Chicago Music College and received his doctorate from Simmons Institute, Charleston, South Carolina.

Thomas Dorsey is known and loved throughout the world as the "Father of Gospel Music". During his lifetime, he was the recipient of many honors, awards and citations for a Music Ministry that spanned nearly three-quarters of a century. His biography is cited in "Who's Who of Music", and his life's work has been displayed at the Smithsonian Institute in Washington, D.C. As the composer of more than 1,000 songs, Dr. Dorsey is the first African-American to be entered into the Nashville Songwriters' Association International Hall of Fame. Dorsey's life and music are also the focus of the 1982 film documentary, "Say Amen Somebody".

Dr. Thomas Dorsey died in 1993 at the age of ninety-six. His life is a testament to faith, dedication, and trust in God. The National Convention of Gospel Choirs and Choruses, Inc. stands as a monument to a man who dedicated his life to the glory of God and to the cultivation and preservation of Gospel Music as an art form, and more importantly, as an avenue of worship and a corridor to the very presence of God.
