

Ministry Spotlight



Music Ministry

The Music Ministry has always been an essential part of worship service at the Baptist church. At Mount Aery our Music Ministry has been going through a transition since the departure of the Music Minister. I interviewed Pastor Bennett about what he is looking for in a new music minister and what are his expectations of the music ministry as a whole. Here is our conversation:

Me: Good evening Pastor. Thank you for taking the time to talk to me.

Pastor: Thank you Sister for dealing with my hectic schedule.

Me: No problem. So I'll jump right into my questions. I know that we (Mount Aery) are in the process of looking for a new Music Minister. Beyond the specifics listed in the job description, what are you looking for in a new Music Minister?

Pastor: Beyond the job description we are looking for someone that has a willingness to learn, someone who will partner with the pastor and the disciples of the church, and someone who has an openness to grow and become a witness to the gospel of Jesus the Christ. They must know how to read music some experience in terms of diverse music genres because we are a diverse, multigenerational congregation that likes Mahalia Jackson, Kirk Franklin, etc. We like quartet singing choir singing and it would be great if Mount Aery had all of that.

Me: As far as the choir, are there any changes that you are looking to make there?

Pastor: Right now we are keeping our regular schedule of the Mass Choir singing on first Sunday, Praise Team on Second Sunday, Men's Choir on third Sunday and Chosen Generation our youth choir on fourth Sunday. I don't see us changing that necessarily. Obviously people may adjust, like the number of members may grow in each of those groups. I hope that we may attract more male vocalist to the ministry that will display their skill set in both the praise team and the choir itself. Then when the director of music comes we will partner with that person to see what best would work but right now we are looking to have the choirs that are integrated continue to be integrated. Just expand the breath of our songs.

Me: When you developed the idea of the 21 Days of Prayer for the Music Ministry what was the premise behind it? What was your goal?

Pastor: The premise was to use the power of prayer which gives us an understanding of our direction. Biblically, it is in our prayer time that some of our descendants come down as well as direction can be received thru God in terms of the way we are to move in ministry. It was also a way of unifying the choir and affirming the work that the choir has done and yet calling us in some unifying fashion beyond just the singing.

Me: In closing, what do you hope to see from the minister of music?

Pastor: I hope to see a broader and more diversified Music Ministry that is in sync and in partnership with the dance ministry and all the other ministries that minister on Sunday. I hope to see an even more anointed group of men and women, boys and girls and teenagers that are willing to display their gifts to minister to the congregation as well as the community. I hope to see the ministry go to a new dimension of not only skill, performance skill but chorally to music ministry.

I would like to express my appreciation for all of our past Ministers of Music since I have been here, 18 years, Minister Mark Murray, Brother William Acosta and Melvin Andersen. I want to thank all of our directors, Corvina Nielsen, Denise Hanks, D'Andre Haynes and for anyone I missed I want to say thank you for all your work.

African American Women Creating History

In Celebration of Women's History Month

Thirty years ago there were no Black women in the White House, other than the staff, none leading a Fortune 500 company, and none owning a cable network.

A lot has changed in the past thirty years. Today, the First Lady, Michelle Obama, is a Black woman as is Ursula Burns the CEO of Xerox and Oprah Winfrey who owns a television network. Black women are on the move.

It is a time in which one-third of employed Black women work in management or professional jobs, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics and a record number are attending college. Black women with college degrees earn nearly as much as similarly educated white women. The number

of businesses owned by Black women has nearly doubled in the past decade to more than 900,000, according to census figures.

The health of African-Americans has also improved over the last thirty years. Data published in 2011 from the National Vital Statistics System, revealed that the life expectancy of African American women has increased from 68 to 77.4 years.

Many factors have helped improve our health such as regular medical care, exercise, a healthy diet, and timely screening tests. We must be vigilant as we strive to make progress and reach (and hopefully exceed) the life expectancy of white women which is 80.6 years. We need to be aware of these preventative health practices to make sure we are properly screened in order to ensure a healthier future for ourselves and our families.

A number of factors can affect a woman's risk for heart disease, diabetes and cancer. Some factors, such as getting older and family history, cannot be controlled. Yet, you can lower your risk of these diseases by changing some aspects of your life:

- Y
- **Don't smoke.** If you smoke, try to quit.
- Keep a healthy weight.
- **▼** Eat healthy foods. Eat lots of fruits, vegetables, and whole grains.
- **▼** Make physical activity a habit.
 - **Limit alcohol** to no more than one drink per day.

Women also can protect themselves by getting regular checkups and screenings. It's all about doing what Black women do best – nurture, but this time it's nurturing and taking care of *ourselves*.



Black History Moment: Bessie Coleman

The First African American Woman Pilot – Queen Bessie

March is Women's History Month so we are spotlighting the first African American Female Pilot in our Black History Moment to celebrate both Black History and Women's History. Enjoy Queen Bessie's story!!

Bessie Coleman was the first African American to earn an international pilot's license. She dazzled crowds with her stunts at air shows and refused to be slowed by racism (a dislike or disrespect of a person based on their race).

Early life

Bessie Coleman was born on January 26, 1892, in a one-room, dirt-floored cabin in Atlanta, Texas, to George and Susan Coleman, the illiterate (unable to read and write) children of slaves. When Bessie was two years old, her father, a day laborer, moved his family to Waxahachie, Texas, where he bought a quarter-acre of land and built a three-room house in which two more daughters were born. In 1901 George Coleman left his family. Bessie's mother and two older brothers went to work and Bessie was left as caretaker of her two younger sisters.

Education for Coleman was limited to eight grades in a one-room schoolhouse that closed whenever the students were needed in the fields to help their families harvest cotton. Coleman easily established her position as family leader, reading aloud to her siblings and her mother at night. She often assured her ambitious church-going mother that she intended to "amount to something." After completing school she worked as a laundress and saved her pay until 1910 when she left for Oklahoma to attend Langston University. She left after one year when she ran out of money.

Back in Waxahachie Coleman again worked as a laundress until 1915, when she moved to Chicago, Illinois, to live with her older brother, Walter. Within months she became a manicurist and moved to a place of her own while continuing to seek—and finally, in 1920, to find—a goal for her life: to become a pilot.

Learning to fly

After befriending several leaders in South Side Chicago's African American community, Coleman found a sponsor in Robert Abbott (1868–1940), publisher of the nation's largest African American weekly, the Chicago Defender. There were no African American aviators (pilots) in the area and, when no white pilot was willing to teach her to fly, Coleman turned to Abbott, who suggested that she go to France. The French, he insisted, were not racists and were the world's leaders in aviation.

Coleman left for France late in 1920. There she completed flight training at the best school in France and was awarded her Fédération Aéronautique Internationale (F.A.I.; international pilot's license) license on June 15, 1921. She traveled Europe, gaining further flying experience so that she could perform in air shows.

Her mission



Back in New York in August 1922, Coleman outlined the goals for the remainder of her life to reporters. She would be a leader, she said, in introducing aviation to her race. She would found a school for aviators of any race, and she would appear before audiences in churches, schools, and theaters to spark the interest of African Americans in the new, expanding technology of flight.

Intelligent, beautiful, and well spoken, Coleman often exaggerated her already remarkable accomplishments in the interest of better publicity and bigger audiences. As a result, the African American press of the country, primarily weekly newspapers, quickly proclaimed her "Queen Bess."


In 1923 Coleman purchased a small plane but crashed on the way to her first scheduled West Coast air show. The plane was destroyed and Coleman suffered injuries that hospitalized her for three months. Returning to Chicago to recover, it took her another eighteen months to find financial backers for a series of shows in Texas. Her flights and theater appearances there during the summer of 1925 were highly successful, earning her enough to make a down payment on another plane. Her new fame was also bringing in steady work. At last, she wrote to one of her sisters, she was going to be able to earn enough money to open her school for fliers.

Black History Moment: Bessie Coleman continues

A tragic ending

Coleman left Orlando, Florida, by train to give a benefit exhibition for the Jacksonville Negro Welfare League, scheduled for May 1, 1926. Her pilot, William D. Wills, flew her plane into Orlando, but had to make three forced landings because the plane was so worn and poorly maintained. On April 30, 1926, Wills piloted the plane on a trial flight while Coleman sat in the other cockpit to survey the area over which she was to fly and parachute jump the next day. Her seat belt was unattached because she had to lean out over the edge of the plane while picking the best sites for her program. At an altitude of 1,000 feet, the plane dived, and then flipped over, throwing Coleman out. Moments later Wills crashed. Both were killed.

On May 2, 1926, thousands of mourners — among them hundreds of schoolchildren who had heard Coleman lecture on the glories of aviation — attended a memorial service in Jacksonville. Three days later her remains arrived in Chicago, where thousands more attended a funeral at the city's Pilgrim Baptist Church. Several years after her death, black aviators inspired by her pioneering achievements formed a network of Bessie Coleman Aero Clubs. A new organization known as the Bessie Coleman Aviators Club, open to women pilots of all races, was founded in 1977 — some 50 years after her death by a group of black women pilots from the Chicago area. Every April, on the anniversary of Coleman's death, the Bessie Coleman Aviators, together with pilots from the Chicago American Pilots Association and the Negro Airmen International, fly low over Lincoln Cemetery in the Chicago suburb of Blue Island to drop flowers on her grave. As an additional tribute to the life and courage of the world's first black woman pilot, in 1990, Chicago Mayor Richard M. Daley renamed Old Mannheim Road at O'Hare Airport "Bessie Coleman Drive." In 1992 he proclaimed May 2nd "Bessie Coleman Day in Chicago." Shortly thereafter, Coleman received national recognition when the U.S. Postal Service issued a stamp commemorating her extraordinary life and accomplishments.

Our Lenten Fast to God for 2012

What is Lent?

Lent is a period of 40 days not including Sundays, dedicated by Christians to repentant prayer and fasting in preparation for Resurrection Sunday. This is the period of reflection upon the voluntary struggle and suffering of Jesus, The Christ and His ultimate triumph over death, hell and the grave.

The first day of Lent is Ash Wednesday. Christians who observe Ash Wednesday participate in special services, which include putting ashes on one's forehead as a sign of repentance for sin.

What is Fasting?

A Biblical definition of fasting is a Christian's voluntary abstinence from food for spiritual purposes. It is Christian, for fasting by a non-Christian obtains no eternal value because the disciple's motive and purpose are to be God centered.

Fasting is voluntary in that it is not to be coerced. Fasting is more than just the ultimate crash diet for the body. It is abstinence from food for spiritual purposes.

There is a broader view of fasting that is often overlooked. This is the approach Richard Foster takes when he defines fasting as "a voluntary denial of a normal function for the sake of intense spiritual activity." **

So then, fasting does not always deal with abstinence from food. Sometimes we may need to fast from involvement with other people, or from the media, from the telephone, from talking, from sleep, etc., in order to become more absorbed in a time of spiritual activity. Fasting includes abstinence from anything that is legitimate in and of itself for the sake of some spiritual purpose. **

What is the Purpose of Fasting?

The example of fasting in the New Testament show that the people of God often engaged in fasting when they had to make unusually difficult decisions, undertake challenging tasks or faced unusually strong opposition from Satan. When accompanied by prayer, fasting is often done to separate a person as much as possible from the common affairs of everyday life.

This separation period allows the person or group of persons to direct all spiritual attention on important issues without distraction. *

During Lent, the goal for Mount Aery is to:

"Make every effort to keep the unity of the Spirit through the bond of peace... until we all reach unity in the faith and in the knowledge of the Son of God and become mature attaining to the whole measure of the fullness of Christ."

Ephesians 4:3 & 11


Why are We Fasting as a Congregation?

To pray for our prayer agenda:

- That we rebuild faith, family and finances
- That Pastor and Congregation stay focused on its mission in the midst of distractions
- That we (Pastor and Congregation) gain great insight into balancing what we are able to do and what only God can do.
- That there will be a greater number of disciples participating in the various in-reach and outreach ministries of the church
- For divine covering as we mature in the faith
- That the teaching and preaching ministries of the church grow in effectiveness and quality (whoever does it; Pastor, Associate Ministers, Laity, Guests)
- For insight into the Word of God and its relevance to us and those to whom we minister
- For being grounded in the Word of God
- For discovering how we are "wired" 9types.com
- For discovering and using our spiritual gifts
- That we are a gifted congregation
- For maintaining the effectiveness of our gifts (rest and renewal)
- Understanding that Jesus is our example of a gifted Savior
- For individual and collective prosperity (fiscally, emotionally, physically, and spiritually)

Pastor is asking that the disciples of Mount Aery do not purchase any Easter paraphernalia (new clothing for Easter, candy, baskets or other commercial items.) Pastor is also asking that we refrain from negative conversation about all People and in particular, People of Color.





- 1. Telephone refrain from engaging in gossip or "They Say" conversations
- 2. Shopping refrain from excessive and unnecessary cash and credit card spending
- 3. Food minimize eating foods or intake that are harmful to your physical temple
- 4. Television significantly reduce TV viewing hours
- 5. Fear discover what your comfort zone is and then ask God if its time to step out of it.
- 6. Other any other thing that you enjoy and/or know that is not good for you

What Should We Do to Replace These Things?

Instead of engaging in one of the previously mentioned activities, consider the following:

- 1. Pray for our purposes up out of our prayer agenda.
- 2. Study the Word of God.
- 3. Spend quality fellowship time with the faithful in Christ.
- 4. Extend yourself by reaching out to someone in need.
- 5. Refuse to be pulled into situations and things that hinder your spiritual witness.
- 6. Read positive material that will lead to your emotional, spiritual and social growth.
- 7. Set monies aside from the non-purchase of Easter paraphernalia for tithing, personal savings, investing, and for your personal and spiritual edification such as the MAAFA, Women's events, Men's events, Youth events or sacrificial giving.

How Long Will We Fast?

We will begin on Ash Wednesday, February 22nd and continue through Resurrection Sunday, April 8th. Individuals will commit to fasting from something of their choosing. In addition, every Friday beginning the Friday after Ash Wednesday to Good Friday, we will engage in a food fast from sun up to sun down (6am to 6 pm).

Does Fasting Work? Yes!

Who Should Fast?

Everyone is encouraged to participate in the general fast by making a commitment to fast from something that would require some form of sacrifice in their daily living habits. Every day at 6am, we will lift out of our prayer agenda. Every Friday during the hours of 6am to 6pm, those who are able, will abstain from food and only intake juices and water. Due to dietary restrictions, some may not be able to participate in the Friday food fast. Please consult your physician before engaging with this fast.

Can Fasting Be Done Incorrectly?

Fasting can be done incorrectly when persons fast insincerely. The Bible sites clear examples of some people who made a show of their fasting, thinking they were impressing others and in particular impressing God; but they were only inviting God's condemnation. (Isaiah 58:3-5, Matthew 6:16-18; Luke 18:12). By contrast, God approved of true fasting, whether individual or collective when it was combined with genuine prayer (Matthew 4:1-4; Luke 2:37; Acts 13:2-3).*

Whitney Elizabeth Houston August 9, 1963 – February 11, 2012

This is Women's History Month and I had several women in mind to write about. As I put on my thinking cap and came up with several names, Corretta Scott King, Dr. Betty Shabazz, Sojourner Truth, Maya Angelou, so many woman who have graced this planet who have made insurmountable contributions to this country. I said to myself why not Whitney E. Houston; a legendary Icon, beautiful, statuesque sister with an amazing VOICE that she shared with the world.

Personally, I loved Whitney from day one when she first hit the music scene with her VOICE, "the VOICE" in 1986. The strongest and most prolific voices you will ever hear in history.

I woke up that morning thinking about my father who passed away three years ago in Atlanta, Georgia. I was there with him and my family when he passed the night before thanksgiving in 2009. You heard the stories, you watched the funeral, and you saw for yourself the woman behind the mask. We as women and people struggle with our demons just like Whitney. Some people share and some people don't. We as a people and particularly Christian folk have to learn how to not judge one another but to lift each other up.

She was loved all over the world, nationally and internationally. Her character was none other than a woman who wanted to be heard, who wanted to be loved and most of all, a woman who wanted to be respected.

My heart goes out to her mother who raised her in the church with morals and values, her daughter whom she loved unconditionally and people all over the world who loved the tall, statuesque, beautiful woman with "the VOICE".
