

M.A.Y.A. Bridges the gap with the Seniors

The Mount Aery Young Adults (MAYA) share in the blessing of having had elders in our lives whose wisdom offered a strong foundation that is yet helping us navigate along our journey. MAYA recognized early on the importance of establishing greater fellowship and relationships with our elders. Out of this consciousness came the Bridging the Gap Senior Breakfast Fellowship.

MAYA came together to prepare and serve breakfast to the seniors on Saturday morning, October 9, and more than 60 seniors blessed us with their presence. Ten seniors, including Brother Paul Mendez, Deacon Regina Mosley, Deacon Dover Seawright, Brother Otis Hart, Sister Christine White, Sister Audrey Barr, Minister Queenie Currin, Deacon Naomi Holmes, and Deacon Willie and Deaconess Fannie Baldwin, very openly and passionately shared their life experiences, words of wisdom, and even imparted a few poems by Langston Hughes.

MAYA was reminded of the great history of Mount Aery Baptist Church and the personal sacrifices that were made for the ministry. We were further encouraged to: Hold fast to our dreams; Keep walking through the rain; Reflect and thank God; Be good to people and reach out and share; Get the education that our parents fought for with their lives; Observe everything and watch and pray; Not allow ourselves to be derailed by the temptations of the world; and not to focus on what we don't have, but use what we do have!

There was one sentiment that overwhelming resounded throughout the morning, and it was the need to return to the sense of community and love we once shared as a people. The Elders spoke of how they grow up poor, yet not feeling like they were lacking anything because of the commitment and responsibility that everyone had to and for each other. Family helped family and neighbors helped neighbors.

MAYA has since reflected on the charge to re-establish our sense of community and love. In doing so, several questions surfaced as to how we came to lose that unselfish love and concern for our family and neighbor. Was it a residual effect of a false sense of having "arrived" after the Jim Crow laws were overruled by the Civil Rights Act of 1964? Was it due to opportunities we've been afforded that has enabled us to become more independent and self-sufficient? Whatever the impetus was for the change in how we respond to humanity, it is clear that the return to family and community values need to begin with young adults teaching their children by example.

We thoroughly enjoyed the fellowship with our seniors, and MAYA is looking forward to future opportunities to share as we all continue to grow together here at the Mount. When asked what they thought of the Bridging the Gap Senior Breakfast Fellowship, Deaconess Seawright responded, "It was beautiful, breakfast was delicious, and I am glad we the seniors had an opportunity to share with the young adults." She and other seniors all want to know, "When will we do this again?"

PLEASE SHARE WITH US YOUR EXPERIENCE WITH THE MAAFA:

"It has been a beautiful experience and sad experience. We have made progress with the MAAFA production and I thank God for Pastor Bennett, Dr. Youngblood, the MAAFA cast and crew to be able to share our history. It is a very important part of our lives to share our history. I am proud and thankful to participate in it. It has given me strength to go on in life and have wisdom and understanding to continue to go on. I am truly blessed by God. "

HOW HAS THE MAAFA IMPACTED YOU?

"The MAAFA shows us where we are and where we are going. I understand things now that I didn't understand before...there were things I was going through and didn't understand. I try to help those who don't understand. "

YOU SAID IT HAS BEEN A SAD EXPERIENCE, WILL YOU SHARE WITH US WHAT THAT SADNESS WAS?

"The sad experience was like Jeremiah. I am a crying person. When people don't understand what is going on my heart cries. When you can't get to them because they think the problem is you, when you do all you can to get them to see and hear, it makes me weep." She now understands why Jeremiah wept.

WHY IS THE MAAFA SO POWERFUL?

"We are going through the same pain and hurt in a different way, a more educated way. Before we couldn't make changes, now we can, but there are those who don't understand and don't want to make changes or except change. We are living in rough, tough times...some people don't have insurance, are losing their homes...same as the house meetings, yet there are people who don't understand. We need to keep on. Sometimes the strong ones get weak, that is why it is important for us to be together. "

She said we need to continue having love, joy, peace...the fruit of the Spirit. It is hard but we have to have it. We need to find the way and keep going. Every little bit counts.

Everyone she meets no matter where she is she wants to greet them with the joy of the Spirit. It keeps her going and helps her to sleep at night. She gets high when things are good and when things are bad. If you want to know why she is crying, ask her. "I am not burdened down, I am thankful. It didn't lay me down. What hurts is that people hear the word and don't follow the word."

The Green Workforce is Getting Stronger

The green workforce is getting stronger.

The WorkPlace, Inc., this week -- joined by Congressman Jim Himes (CT-4) -- honored the first class of graduates in the Green-Up Bridgeport initiative. The project is made possible by a \$4 million grant through the U.S. Department of Labor's Pathways Out of Poverty program, which is funded by the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act.

The purpose of these grants is to teach workers the skills required in high growth and emerging industries, including energy efficiency and renewable energy.

"This federal investment in occupational skills training is critical for Bridgeport's workforce to be ready to meet the challenges of the emerging energy efficiency, renewable energy and other green industries," Himes said. "Putting Americans back to work now is absolutely critical."

U.S. Secretary of Labor Hilda Solis visited The WorkPlace, Inc. in March to kick off the job-training program. More than 400 individuals have completed an orientation process and more than 200 have completed the initial training that encourages participants to review their career options. They are receiving training in areas such as: HVAC; electricity and plumbing; resource management, drinking water and wastewater treatment; landscaping, recycling and remediation; construction; architecture and engineering; and installation, maintenance and repair.

"The WorkPlace not only provides worker training in difficult times, but fosters partnerships in green initiatives," Joseph Carbone, president and CEO of The WorkPlace, Inc., said.

The Green Workforce is Getting Stronger continues

For individuals who are living below or near the poverty level, the current economic downturn has created a unique set of challenges, and has heightened the need to find pathways out of poverty and into employment. This program offers the opportunity for residents of Bridgeport to immerse themselves in green education and training within four career tracks: green construction, building energy systems, resource management and transportation. This funding will make it possible to match the neediest residents with training in occupations that are in-demand in a range of green industries.

Susan Giordano, president of the Institute of Environmental Management and Technology Inc. in Shelton explains, "These grant monies have allowed for training in energy and environmental issues for the unemployed and underemployed in Connecticut. This training will lead to jobs in energy and will provide a sound basis for future employment in energy and the environmental sector."

The individuals recognized have trained at Environmental Management Geological Consultants, Inc., and had the opportunity to engage in training that will allow them to earn up to six licenses and/or credentials. The participants acknowledged have chosen to pursue careers in Green Construction and Building Energy Systems. For many, participation in this program was a life-changing experience.

"I am extremely honored to accept this award of completion from the Green-Up Bridgeport program. This award is confirmation that when commitment meets opportunity the impossible becomes reality," said program participant Anthony Foster. "This program addressed barriers to employment and gave me the chance to obtain job skills that will lead to competitive employment."

"I feel so privileged to have been given this opportunity," said Michelle Long. "I have been searching for a long time for a career that would give me a sense of accomplishment both professionally and personally. This program has fulfilled both of these criteria by giving me the knowledge to help make the environment a safer place for not only this generation but generations to come. As a mother of two, that is important to me."

"The Green-Up program has given me the assurance of gaining state licenses and certificates to enable me to find work in this economy," said Rondell Young, 32, a lifelong resident of Bridgeport. "I would recommend this program to anyone who is looking to gain some type of skill or training to better themselves."

Green-Up Bridgeport is a project of The Workplace, Inc. The program represents a commitment and investment in occupational skills training that is critical for Bridgeport's workforce to be ready to meet the challenges of the emerging energy efficiency, renewable energy and other green industries.



BRIDGING THE GAPThe passing of Bishop Kenneth Moales

Tuesday Morning, arly September 21, 2010, I was awakened by a phone call from Pastor Kevin Ginyard, President of the Interdenominational Ministerial Alliance of Greater Bridgeport and Vicinity, Inc. (IMA) whose somber voice communicated to my voicemail "Brother Bennett, we lost a great soldier tonight." With both shock and sleep in my eyes, I stumbled upstairs, informed Donna and made the seemingly endless journey to Bridgeport Hospital. I arrived at the emergency room and was greeted with hugs, tears and stoic faces that conveyed the sentiment "I just can't believe it." And yet whether we believed it or not God did indeed call a General in His army from labor to reward.

I realized that the loss was not only shared by his family, the people of the Cathedral of the Holy Spirit and the city of Bridgeport, Mount Aery and Bishop Moales had enjoyed a powerful and productive relationship over Bishop's lifetime. From Reverends Bass, Smalls, and Streets, Bishop Moales, from time to time, blessed the people of Mount Aery with his awesome and anointed singing, teaching and preaching ministry. This was a significant partnership given the history that "traditional Baptists" and "traditional Pentecostals" did not usually share in worship and praise. Yet the extraordinary ability of Bishop Moales to cross boundaries to minister proved more and more effective as his ministry matured and expanded.

I met Bishop in 1994 during my initial months as pastor of Mount Aery. Even then, I appreciated Bishop Moales' perspective and willingness to share his wisdom yet openness to embrace the perspective of this new pastor in the community. That same spirit allowed our relationship to grow and solidify over years through various workshops, preaching and teaching events, community meetings and strategy sessions we participated in together. Bishop Moales was a secure and strong leader galvanizing the local preachers during his tenure as President of the IMA. Bishop Moales was also extremely supportive of me and Mount Aery during my tenure as President of the IMA. I shall always remember the encouragement Bishop Moales would give me (and at times other preachers in his company), to stay committed to ministry in Bridgeport and yet make time to get away from ministry in order to renew and rejuvenate my spirit for more effective ministry. Bishop Moales modeled that process of balancing ministry through his local commitment to Bridgeport yet his leadership in the broader national and international ministry of the Pentecostal Church and Gospel Music world. Whether it was at the opening of our health care center or the MAAFA Influence Production, Bishop Moales would make every effort to be supportive of me and the ministry of Mount Aery.

As much as I would like to claim to be the sole beneficiary of Bishop Moales' ministerial mentorship, there have been literally thousands of clergy that Bishop Moales had poured in some sense of purpose and wisdom about the ministry and life. Bishop Moales was a stately leader in the Bridgeport community who made a decision to trust God and bloom where God had planted him. Bishop Moales' ministry could have blossomed anywhere in this country, but he believed God wanted him to be faithful in his home town of Bridgeport, and so he was! He lent his spiritual and cultural wisdom to many Common Council meetings, Board of Education meetings, IMA meetings and citywide gatherings. He had an ability of helping opposing sides find common ground and resolution. Bishop's commitment to the local Bridgeport community was complemented by his involvement in the larger national and international Pentecostal and Gospel Music world. Bishop Moales, being president of the Thomas Dorsey convention, afforded him the opportunity to interact with some of the nation's top Gospel artists and ministry leaders. In addition, as a Presiding Prelate of his Pentecostal connection, Bishop Moales was seen as a "senior sage" whose wisdom was to be sought and adhered to. And yet with all of his accomplishments, all of his accolades, all of his national and international connections, Bishop Moales never lost the common touch. We will miss Bishop Moales' presence, perspective and power yet we know his work will live on through his son Elder Kenneth H. Moales Jr. and the mighty people of the Cathedral of the Holy Spirit. Let us continue to pray for them, his family and all who have been impacted by this sudden loss. Thank you Bishop for being faithful to the work God assigned your hands.

Michelle Obama visits Connecticut


